

When Comedian Mollie Gross takes the stage you know one thing for sure, she doesn't take orders, she gives them. A proud member of the **Silent Ranks**, this diminutive blonde dynamo has been talking about being a military wife since her husband's first deployment in 2008 and has been performing to spectacular reviews.

To entice Mollie to marry him, her husband made all sorts of promises: like he would never get on her nerves because he'd always be gone, and she could have all the babies she wanted because it would be free. Tempted but not convinced, the clincher was when he explained BAH, and separation pay. She said, "Free money! I'm in!"

Life on base took some getting used to for the Southern Belle. She was not the "perfect military wife" at first. And at times it seemed like she and her husband were speaking a different language. She asks other military wives, "Was it just me or were all of you concerned when your husband called to say he would be home late because he and his men were going on a five mile hump?"

After four years living on base, two wartime deployments, serving as a Key Volunteer twice, and standing in as a birthing coach, ("I drew the line at the cutting the cord part ...") she has picked up a few things about military wives and their needs. She has also learned a thing or two about the returning troops adjusting from time spent in Iraq. When her husband first came home, she figured out it was a bad idea to come out of the shower with a towel on her head.

"I was the worst - absolutely did not know what I was doing," Gross said.

Wife," Gross is starting her pour at Camp Pendleton on Wednesday at the Enlisted Wives Club and Officers' Wives' Club.

Groas met her future hanband, Jon, while he was stationed at Marine Corps Base Quantico in Virginia. When he received orders for Camp Pendleton, the two cloped and moved to Southern California.

They lived at Camp Pendleton for four years and experienced two war-time deployments with the 2nd Battalion 1st Marine Regiment. Three years ago her husband got out of the Marines and they moved to Los Angeles so Gross could pursue her career as a comedian.

"When it came time to re-up, he said. You gave me four years, so I'm going to give you four years (to try connedy)." So we mayed to L.A.," Gross said.

When Gross' husband was deployed, she used comedy as a way to mask her depression and sadness. periences for jokes.

"Once we got out I started (telling milltary jokes)" Gross said "I didn't doit when he was in; it was too close to home."

After her husband came home from each deployment, Gross would stop performing.

She said audience reaction to the jokes varied. Sometimes the crowd was not pleased.

"Why am I entertaining these people that are drunk in the club? There are women on these bases that are wo bored and lonely," Gross said.

"I love the troops, but the troops don't need me. My girls need me, my wives need me," Gross said. "I'm not needed in Afghanistan and Iraq."

Gross said she wanted to give back to the women who belped her through the hard times. "I remember how miserable it was to go through those deployments to be taken away from all of your friends and family and the one person you're most comfortable with, your husband, is gone," Gross said.

Her goal is to make her performances free to the wives because she knows how they struggle.

"When a Marine comes home from fraq - 1 had to deal with that for two years. I had to come down from that, 1 had to come down from leaving the military life, deal with the depression of nor being a military wife." Gross said. "Now it's time to give back."

Along with her current stand-up tour, Gross is working on a book about her experience.

Military wives in Gross' addlence have asked for a CD that they can listen to in the car. She said the hopes to make one from an upcoming performance.

Gross hopes to perform again at Camp Pendleton and at the Marine Corps Air Station Miramar this spring.

Comedy is serious business

Spouse Calls: Delivering Humor that Heals

Mollie Gross is serious about comedy. Her standup routine brings healing humor to military spouses, she said.

"One comment that I get the most that means the most," she said from her Los Angeles home, "is 'Thank you for making me laugh instead of making me cry.' "

A Marine wife — her husband, Jon, is now active reserve — Mollie says, "Once a Marine, always a Marine. That's how my husband and I are."

That's not all she is. "When my husband met me, I was a comedian and an actress," she said. Mollie scaled back her career to focus on her new role: military wife.

After four years and two deployments, Jon left active duty, and they moved to L.A., where Mollie pursued her dream of being a comedian. It didn't take long to realize where her heart was.

During a performance at a Hollywood club about a year ago, she said she asked herself, "What am I doing? These people are drunk, and they don't care."

"There's a bunch of women right now ... on Camp Pendleton," she recalled thinking. "I bet there's a deployment going on."

"I changed my entire direction. I redid my entire act and started contacting bases," she said. Now she performs comedy about military life for military spouses.

"I'll go anywhere," she said of her touring plans.

For installations she can't visit, her comedy CD debuts in December. Her book, based on her life and comedy, is due out next year, she said, and a television project is in the works.

Mollie said reaction to her military comedy is: "Finally ... someone is acknowledging the craziness of this lifestyle." Some spouses need cheering up during deployment, she said. Others struggle with reunions.

"When they come back from war or deployment, they're going to be different, and you're going to be different," Mollie said. "You're going to have to rely on those vows that you took before God to get you through that."

"That's a serious message and an important message that I'm also trying to do throughout the comedy," she said. "When they come back, that's the hardest part ... I had to find out the hard way."

Deployments, acronyms, rank consciousness, even posttraumatic stress disorder, all are fodder for Mollie's act.

"Don't take your husband's word on PTSD," she tells audiences. "You need to get the facts. For instance, taking out the trash is not going to bring out flashbacks."

"Other people in the world can say 'That's horrible; that's a serious thing,' but if we don't laugh about it, if we can't, then what?" she asked.

"The way I've always coped in my life," she said, "is to take a situation and ... turn it into a really funny story."

Not everyone is amused. Mollie said some are offended by her language or subject matter.

"At Parris Island, somebody walked out," she said. "A person at Pendleton walked out. One out of two hundred isn't bad."

"I'm a Christian, but don't get me wrong; I say things in my act that are wild. No kids are allowed in my shows. It's an adult show, and we're all married."

She sets her own standards. "I know where that line is," she said, "and I don't cross it."

"I think Jesus had a really good sense of humor," said Mollie. "I think he gave me a gift and a talent. My job is to take that gift and talent to be used as an instrument for his will in my life.

"I think that nothing is more healing than laughter."
